During 2022 we supported distressed microbusinesses, provided direct business counseling, offered educational workshops, provided essential assistance with tax preparation, and helped Vermonters hold on to and grow their savings accounts. We offered concrete strategies to help Vermonters build a stronger future. "VCAP's statewide Micro Business Development Program (MBDP) successfully provided over \$2.3M in \$5,000 EMBRACE grants to 471 of Vermont's smallest businesses impacted by the pandemic. VCAP REACH

3.45 million meals were prepared and distributed to date through Vermont Everyone Eats (VEE) under the leadership of SEVCA

260 participating restaurants are on track to purchase \$3.7 million worth of food from more than 300 Vermont farms and food producers with more than 35% of the ingredients for meals being sourced from local Vermont businesses

Community Kitchen Academy employed graduates to feed the hungry during the pandemic

5,154 individuals were assisted in applying for SNAP benefits

VCAP ANNUAL IMPACT

54,352 hot meals were made and distributed to Vermonters in need

18,955 boxes/bags of groceries were distributed

Homelessness and Housing Assistance

"At our Community Resource Center we see up to 140 people a day who are struggling with homelessness and housing. We provide hot meals and services every day. A young mom often comes in with her daughter because her daughter always asks to go to the restaurant. The mom told one of our volunteers how good it makes her feel that her daughter thinks she is eating at a restaurant. Weatherization, Emergency Home Heating, Crisis Fuel, Warmth, Home Heating & Utility Assistance

Vermonters with low incomes are disproportionately impacted by the effects of our changing climate – from heat waves and flooding to health disparity and food insecurity. VCAP leads Vermont's Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) which is among Vermont's top strategies for lowering our carbon footprint and reducing the costs of energy use. As a member of the Vermont Climate Council, VCAP gives voice to the needs of the most vulnerable and works to advance a "just transition" to a clean energy future. — Sue Minter, Capstone Community Action

4,491 Vermonters received crisis fuel for short term emergency assistance

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
